#### **Seasearch Training 2016**

A Seasearch Observer course was held in April and led by Trudy Russell and Matt Slater. A total of 5 divers were trained. A programme of dives was provided for local volunteers through the summer and a large number of surveys were also carried out by surveyors from outside the county.

#### **Scillies dive survey**

Kate lock and friends did a week trip to the Scillies in September 2016. 10 survey forms plus lots of photos wertaken – will feature in BSAC dive magazine. Gravel samples were taken by Jon Chamberlain and sent to Conchological Society for full species list analvsis



A nudibranch *Thordisa azmanii* was photographed and collected by Bernard Picton. Bernard is still to confirm record from the specimen but it may be a new record for the UK. Glen King saw a boar fish.

#### **Holywell Rocks**

Dive of the year took place at Holywell Bay's Carters Rocks where we were treated to stunning 20m visibility and enjoyed exploring high energy rocky gullies and reefs which extend a long way to the west of the rocks.








### **Crawfish sighted**

This year we have had several crawfish sightings, and anecdotally

we are hearing about more than ever before, it seems that this species is making a comeback. We are urging dive clubs and schools to report sightings direct to us as we hope that this species is here to stay and won't get over exploited as it was in the 1970's and 80's.





#### Scale eyed wrasse

Devon seasearcher Mike Markey logged a very rare record when he photographed a



Scale eyed wrasse *Acantholabrus palloni* at Hand Deeps off South East Cornwall, it was 20cm long making it much larger than a goldsinney wrasse. This species has only been recorded a handful of times in UK waters and we urge divers to keep a look out for it!

# **Monitoring Maerl**



National Seasearch coordinator Chris Wood led two days of Seasearch surveying exploring the maerl beds of the Fal estuary on both the St Mawes bank where the healthiest maerl bed in the UK was surveyed and on the West side of the harbour where plans exist to carry out a major dredge to allow larger ships access to the docks. The surveys showed the importance of

this area with exceptionally high biodiversity and productivity and numerous rarely recorded species.



## Shark buzzes divers at Talland Bay

Seasearch divers carrying out a shore dive at the beautiful Talland Bay near Looe were treated to an exceptionally rare sight of a fleeting glimpse of a 2m long shark as it swam over head amongst thick shoals of whitebait and mackerel. Although unidentified it was most likely either a porbeagle or a blue shark. Not all the divers actually saw the shark, Daryl
